Letter from the Chief Inspector of General Practice

We carried out an announced comprehensive inspection of the practice on 6 October 2014. Breaches of legal requirements were found. After the comprehensive inspection, the practice wrote to us to say what they would do to meet the legal requirements in relation to the breaches of regulation Health and Social Care Act 2008 (Regulated Activities) Regulations 2014: (Regulated Activities) Regulation 19: Fit and proper persons employed.

We undertook this focussed inspection on 17 December 2015 to check that they had followed their plan and to confirm that they now met the legal requirements. This report covers our findings in relation to those requirements. We undertook a focussed desk-based inspection of Dr Javier Oscar Salerno 17 December 2015. This is because the service had been identified as not meeting some of the legal requirements and regulations associated with the Health and Social Care Act 2008. We found that non- clinical staff undertaking the role of chaperon did not have current Disclosure and Barring Checks (DBS).The inspection focused on one of the five questions we ask about services; is the service safe?
